Dear Parents,



I cannot believe that it is nearly Christmas! I have been at Lordswood Girls' School for a whole term, and what a term it has been!

The removal of 'bubbles' has enabled students to move around the school again - this has been welcomed by all members of the school community. It has been lovely to see extra curricular activities return to the school, as well as breakfast club and school trips. The relaxing of measures has meant that we have been able to host two successful open evenings, a school play, two PSHE days, a post 16 taster day, numerous trips and so much more.

Although some normality has resumed, sadly COVID is still very much affecting the day to day functioning of the school. As you will be aware, masks have been reintroduced in communal areas of the school and we are still seeing numerous positive COVID cases each week. Reps came well prepared with questions gathered from their review groups and they grilled Nigel and Aisha on all aspects of the canteen and food. Both Nigel and Aisha left the meeting with pages of notes and have agreed to come back in the spring term to let the Reps know what actions have been taken in response to the Council members' questions.

In light of the news that Lordswood might be joining the King Edward VI Foundation Trust, Council Reps were asked to speak to their classmates about the possibility of a change to the school uniform. Reps compiled lists full of suggestions from students about what their ideal uniform would look like; there were some very imaginative ideas including hats and a new Lordswood tartan! There will be more to follow on this in the new year.

Yet again, fundraising has demonstrated the true generosity and kindness of the school community and the Council has hosted three very successful events. On 22nd October, £874.09 was raised for Breast Cancer Now's Wear It Pink campaign. 19th November saw Children in Need day and the school community came together yet again to raise £753.79. Finally, on 10th December the Council hosted a Christmas Jumper Day in aid of Save the Children and a magnificent £539.97 brought the autumn term fundraising total to £2167.85! This total is utterly fantastic and the Council would like to thank everyone who donated to any of the causes for their generosity in these very challenging times.

Looking forward to the spring term, the Council is going to focus on green and eco projects. The recycling scheme which was successful in pre-Covid times will be reinstated and Reps would also like to start a drive to encourage staff and students to try and reduce energy wastage by turning off equipment and lights after use. They would also like to see a reduction in unnecessary printing and photocopying.

Over the course of the autumn term, each year group had their first Headteacher's Question Time session. All sorts of questions were put to Mrs Cooney and her panel, such as how the school promotes and celebrates the LGBTQ+ community and questions regarding GCSE options. Quite a few of the questions were for Mrs Cooney as students get to know their new Headteacher! The sessions went very well and both students and staff enjoyed them and found them useful. Drama Roundup

Students would like to share some experiences from drama this term.

Key Stage 3 Lessons

In my drama lessons we've been studying Noughts and Crosses by Malorie Blackman. I especially enjoy the classes where the teacher gives us a section of the script from the play which we get to act out, as this tests my acting skills and shows me where I need to improve. It also allows me to recognise my strong points which I can then build on. **Mei**

In Drama this year we have been focusing on the 'Woman in Black' a gothic novel written by Susan Hill; it was first published in the 1980s and based around a lawyer Mr Kipps, who travels to Crythin Gifford to deal with the files of a deceased client. While organising the files in the house of the deceased client he finds himself being followed by a mysterious figure. In Drama we have been focusing on climax and anti-climax situations, climax being a build up of suspense to a moment where a large/ surprising event occurs and anti-climax being a build up of suspense that then flows back to the story without a large event to surprise the audience; this was through a practical piece, in which we focused on the behaviour of the toys in Nathaniel's nursery. We have also attempted a movement sequence, which is a series of movements usually without any dialogue between the actors. We haven't only focused on practical side of drama but also the design side of Drama, we had to design a set in which was practical but also intricate. My favourite activity we have completed in Drama is the anti-climax and climax activity in which we had to create a scene in which the toys in Nathaniel's nursery. Jaiya

Goings On in Science

Year 8 Practical Day

In September the Science Department ran a very successful practical day for Year 8 students. We ran four different practical activities to build on their previous learning which were:

- Lighting a Bunsen burner and heating water
- Making red cabbage indicator and testing pH of solutions
- Microscopes Making an onion cell slide and using the bioviewers
- Testing the friction of different types of surfaces

The day was thoroughly enjoyed by the science staff and most importantly the Year 8 students.

Salters Online Chemistry Club

Salters Online Chemistry Club was launched in September with Years 7-9. We have had a really good uptake from students who can access weekly chemistry videos, fact files and quizzes. Check your science google classroom for the link to join.

A-level Physics Challenge

Our Year 13 physicists battled with the very challenging Physics Olympiad. Our entries have been submitted to the examiners for marking and if our students make it through to the next round then they have a chance to win some pretty amazing prizes including a fully paid trip abroad.

A-level Psychology Trip

Year 13 psychology students were involved in a University Masterclass on the topic of Gender and Crime. They were tasked with specifically creating a programme for year 9 boys to tackle the rising level of sexual harassment and violence against women. This session developed their critical thinking skills in discussing the objectives and focus for the programme. They then had to debate the key issues and formulate a programme which could be delivered in schools in the West Midlands. Students worked alongside university lecturers and students from other schools to share their ideas. The students were praised by the university as being exceptional.

What have students been studying this half term?

Year 7 students completed their induction to science and have had fun learning about Cells and Movement, Light and Sound and Elements and Mixtures.

Year 8 students have enjoyed learning about Breathing and Digestion, Gravity and the Earth and Properties of Waves and their Effects.

Year 9 students have started their GCSE content with Cells, Atomic Structure and the Periodic Table and The Particle Model of Matter.

Year 10 students have studied Quantitative Chemistry, Energy, Bioenergetics and Chemical Changes.

Year 11 students had some time to catch up on their practical skills at the start of the year and then have studied the topics Atmosphere and Ecology before revising for their mock examinations.

Bringing Nations Together in MFL!

This year, the department is taking part in the Connecting Classrooms Project in French. Our year 8 French students have been working hard with Mrs. Southerton on an exciting project which is a virtual exchange program organised by the company Forum by Prometour. The project encourages students to create a series of videos about their daily life and then share them with a partner school in France (Collège Robert Doisneau in Montrouge, in the south west of Paris). Students then, in turn, receive videos from the partner school. In the videos, students follow a range of themes that are in line with the French curriculum studied at Lordswood. In November, students created videos to introduce themselves in French. Students really enjoyed taking part in the videos and were extremely excited to receive the equivalent videos from the partner school. In the spring term, students will create videos to share their daily school routine, giving a tour of the school, and explaining the education system in England. Whilst in the summer term, students will create videos showcasing the hometown or region. Our students have embraced this intercultural exchange and have taken it one step further by agreeing to exchange letters (Christmas, Easter and end of year) to enable students in both countries to experience and appreciate the cultural differences.

The project is proving to be a wonderful opportunity for students to experience French outside the classroom.


On behalf of the RE Department, we would like to wish everyone a peaceful Christmas holiday.

Students pick books within the reading levels they are given by their teacher after they have completed a STAR reading test, and once they have read their book, they complete a quiz on the website which helps to ensure they understand what they have just read. Students need to attempt the quiz no more than 48 hours after reading the book.

As part of the scheme students are given certificates along with prizes for 'milestones' such as completing 10 quizzes and achieving their targets. In the school library we have a Reading Wall of Fame and a Word Millionaire board to celebrate students' success. Since the start of September 2021, Year 7, 8 and 9 students have read over 900 books that's over 48,966,636 words!

As the autumn term ends all students should be congratulated on their efforts but a special mention should go to those students who have achieved some impressive milestones! Four students have become word millionaires reading over 6,123,054 words between them. And one student has read over 25 books passing all her quizzes!



Statists from the Trussels Trust have shown that between 1st April 2020 to 31st March 2021 food banks distributed :

- 2.5 million emergency food parcels to people in crisis, a 33% increase from the previous year
- 980,000 of these went to children, this is a shocking increase compared to five years ago
- The need and usage of food banks increased by 128%

University Masterclass

The T-level Education and Childcare students enjoyed a university masterclass at Newman University, they had two sessions on the topic of the importance of storytelling and developing teamwork. Firstly students looked at children's stories from various time periods and talked about what they liked and didn't like, and it was from here they explored what made a good story. The students worked with the lecturers and students from other schools to use objects such as a little wooden horse or a plastic dinosaur and their imagination to make a story which had the ingredients of what made a good story, we had some very creative suggestions! The team building task was to build a bridge using the resources given (paper and sellotape) which could hold a mobile phone for 15 seconds. Following the activity, which they were very successful at, they reflected on the roles they played in their teams from Belbin's (1981) theory of team roles such as the specialist, the finisher, the implementor or the investigator.

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English Literature A Level - How It Works

English Literature is one of the few subjects at A-level that encourages imagination and creativity in your writing. There isn't really a distinct right or wrong answer when it comes to studying it, giving you leeway to explore themes and key concepts in your essays in a lot more depth. Another good thing about the subject is that you explore an assortment of texts across an extended time period. While you can't escape Shakespeare at A-level, you still have the opportunity to study texts written by a more diverse spectrum of authors i.e. people of colour and women. Though to be fair, there are a lot of interesting messages about the role of race and patriarchy in society that we learn about in Shakespeare's 'Othello.'

In studying literature at A-level, you will find there are several benefits and skills for you to learn and refine. One of the main ones is mastering the art of essay writing - a pretty crucial skill that applies to almost any A-level you might choose. As it is an essay-based subject, you're able to learn to be coherent and succinct, while also discovering the best-suited style of writing for you. Other skills that you will pick up on include critical thinking and perceptive analysis, all of which will develop through your analysis of different texts. Part of your study of English literature involves looking at social, political and religious philosophies and ideologies, as a means to better understand the context of what's being read. Therefore, choosing it as one of your subjects would complement any others you wish to study, especially A-levels like: history, government and politics and philosophy and ethics. I do history and psychology alongside English, and have found that my essay writing skills, as well as contextual research, are transferable to them. This has been pretty helpful when it came to improving my approach to answering exam questions.

Lesson formats vary on a day-to-day basis. But, generally speaking, the lessons involve a lot of verbal communication in the classroom between the teacher and your peers, as opposed to just sitting there and copying notes off the board. This is probably one of the best parts of studying English. With verbal communication as the main form of learning, there are always interesting conversations to be had during class, especially in regards to the social issues and movements that are studied in relation to the set texts e.g. patriarchy and feminism. Furthermore, certain tasks in lessons require you to work in groups and, on occasion, deliver presentations. This is, once again, a critical skill for you to hone in preparation for higher education. The overall atmosphere in lessons is quite positive, and you'll probably find yourself enjoying lessons, as well as enhancing and expanding your own knowledge as you contribute and listen to the contributions of your peers.

Some advice I'd give to students considering studying English Literature at A-level is to stay on top of things and do your reading BEFORE the lessons (I totally did this when I started Year 12...). This will allow you to engage in discussions, and honestly, make your learning experience feel a lot more fun and fulfilling. A-level English literature does require a willingness to study outside of the classroom and reading beyond the allocated texts, but if you go in with the fixed mindset of working hard, you'll find English to be one of the most enjoyable and refreshing subjects available to you. **Sveda**

Parliament Talk

This term, Year 12 Politics students took part in a live seminar on how the general election works in the UK. The seminar was delivered by UK Parliament Education and involved looking at how the First Past the Post voting system works; assessing both its strengths and weaknesses. There was also an opportunity for the students to ask questions to Preet Gill MP for the last ten minutes of the session. The students were able to use their knowledge of politics to ask relevant questions on issues such as climate change and the voting system. Such opportunities ensure that students can fully develop their curriculum knowledge and examine the views of politicians on relevant political debates.

In Sociology, we have continued to work on applying our understanding to a range of relevant examples in both media and education. Recently, we evaluated the claim by one MP that there were now a lack of role models for men in the media. We have also continued to have debates around the reasons for differing rates of achievement amongst different genders, ethnic groups and social classes in education.
